SPECIFICS

- Write a speech on this topic that will last 3-4 minutes.
- The written part of your speech will be a well organized phrase outline with an introduction, body, and conclusion.
- Rehearse your speech but do not wear it out.
- Practice in front of a mirror until your voice and body language are right for this type of speech (somewhat exaggerated).
- You may take a note cards to the podium.

INTRODUCTION

- Refresh your memory for techniques for beginning your speech on pages xxiii-xxv.
- Remember, this is your opportunity to grab your audience's attention which is never easy.
- It also must be clear to your audience what it is that you are ticked off about. Tell them at the beginning.

BODY

- In this part of your speech you must explain your indignation. Why exactly are you so put out?
- Be sure to include details or perhaps instances.
- Your words should indicate your feelings just as your body language should.

CONCLUSION

- Refresh your memory for effective conclusions by reviewing pages xxvi-xxix.
- Remember, this is your last opportunity to impress your audience with your opinion.
